Their touch, their origin, the memories created around them.


The objects' nascent stories - materials, craft, detailing, heritage - gain layers of complexity as they integrate with our daily lives. Our conflict, joy, togetherness, solitude, even our banal activities imbue them with greater significance.

How can we present furniture in a way that communicates its personal value? How can we draw people into the story so they feel connected? How can we bring a piece of Portugal to Stockholm?

At Stockholm Design Week, we presented fourteen new pieces of furniture designed by Jason Miller, Neri&Hu, Matthew Hilton, and Luca Nichetto in a private home in Östermalm. Two actors, Fernando Nobre and Vania Rovisco, moved through the space, bringing each piece to life through vignettes of daily life. Twelve scenes in two acts, created by Lisbon-based Studio Astolfi.

THE STAGE



























Furniture draped in white sheets greeted guests upon arrival.

"After removing their shoes, guests wander through the apartment's many rooms, where pastel-hued walls are hung with gray canvases bearing the names, in simple typeface, of the paintings that usually hang there. Scattered throughout the spaces are the forms of many pieces of furniture, all covered with white sheets. An audio recording plays on repeat throughout, a calming voice outlining the principles of De La Espada. This is the beginning of Let's Pretend This Never Happened, an hour-long interactive performance that [De La Espada founder, Luis] De Oliveira sees as the antidote to the furniture fair, where any inspiration is usually outweighed by a mindnumbing, overwhelming intake of information."

A human sculpture, fusing man and woman, is perched atop the Elliot Dining Table.








WHITE SHEETS

Guests are welcomed with a taste of Portuguese hospitality as Fernando serves prosciutto and wine from the Tavli Table.








SKYPE CALL




KNOCK ON WOOD

TYPEWRITER



Guests are invited to join Vania and Fernando in a game of musical chairs. A bit apprehensive at first, each is soon laughing, running and pushing in a bid to grab that final seat on Solo Dining Chair.







SOFA SCENE

Piling up on the Planalto Sofa like friends and family, guests watch film clips involving sofas and guess the titles.





MIRRORED MEAL








THIS IS A MAN'S WORLD

Fernando sings a lament, a cry of loneliness and fear of losing his loved one.







BED SCENE

In bed, neither character is able to sleep. Internally, anger and isolation struggle with love and a need for connection. The lovers twist and turn in the Solo Bed, pushing away from one another, then toward, then away again.









CABINET OF CURIOSITIES

A connection is found through play: the pair take turns looking through the lens of a View-Master toy.

Fernando brings out a leather suitcase full of personal items, each special to someone involved in the production. Guests are invited to select an item and place it inside the Solo Vitrine, together creating a cabinet of curiosities.











